Jeremiah Community is a life-sharing community, where neighbors overcoming homelessness can live affordably, have purpose and grow meaningful relationships.

HOUSING

Permanent, not temporary or transitional units, right-sized (approx. 450 sq ft) with a front porch, built for the unique needs of individuals overcoming homelessness.



PURPOSE

Opportunities for neighbors to identify their gifts, share them with their community and move those gifts into an economy, where they can earn a dignified income.




RELATIONSHIP

Support from a residential care team (I.e. case managers, volunteers, churches and professional service providers, etc).



- **Micah Ministries** began in 2005, as a way for Fredericksburg churches to care for the community's street neighbors.
- Our work has evolved from a survival response to caring for all aspects of individual's potential.
- Micah cares for unhoused neighbors as part of a coordinated group of other local non-profits called the **Continuum of Care**.
- By placing people in **Housing First** and providing wrap-around support we have reduced chronic homelessness by 56% since 2010.
- Micah currently depends on scattered units throughout the region that are increasingly not affordable and challenging to provide the level of support for the unique and complex needs of chronically unhoused neighbors.
- A sizable segment of our region's street homeless will always need a supportive community to remain stably housed and live a flourishing life.



Unfortunately, catastrophic breakdowns in a family unit can leave people without the relationships necessary to maintain a safe place to live.

To truly overcome homelessness a person needs more than a house. They need a home, a community centered on belonging, connectedness, shared burdens and relationships.


People don't become homeless when they run out of **money**; people become homeless when they run out of **relationships**.



Jeremiah Community will combine small units, studio apartments and support services to create a place where neighbors overcoming homelessness have a place to live, a purpose and meaningful relationships. In Jeremiah Community everyone will be required to pay rent, obey civil law and follow the rules of the community, similar to an HOA.

WHO IS MY UNHOUSED NEIGHBOR?

The average unhoused neighbor in the Fredericksburg Region is a single adult, predominantly male (72%) and white (65%). The average age is 45 with recent growth among young adults and persons over 60.



Most (78%) have one or more disabilities.

- **42**% have chronic health conditions
- 21% were in special education classes as a child
- Almost half (47%) have a serious mental illness
- 68% report four or more adverse childhood experiences
- Less than 30% report a substance abuse issue

Without addressing the root cause of homelessness, taxpayers spend more money than they would if unhoused individuals were offered housing + support.


